Impact

- One hundred and twenty-four children enrolled in Kids Alive Kenya schools and vocational centers. These schools provide children with the tools they'll need to become independent. The vocational centers teach skills like carpentry. Pray for all the families we will influence with the gospel through these new students.
- 2. Separated from his children by force, a desperate refugee father is reunited with them after many agonizing months. The family traveled from the Democratic Republic of the Congo, seeking asylum in Kenya. Unfortunately, the father did not have the proper documentation. As a result, authorities seized the kids and threw the father in jail. After eight months in prison, authorities released him. Through the Kids Alive staff's hard work, they arranged a happy reunion.



A Model of Faith

Maureen was an orphan when she came to Kids Alive in 2016. Young girls in her position are exposed to all sorts of evil, including forced child marriage and violence. We provided her with living necessities and spiritual instruction.

Today, she attends junior high school. Maureen works hard in school and extracurricular activities. She has become a model of faith and hard work among her peers. Maureen is also involved in a local church, where she volunteers in many ways.

Maureen plans to attend college and dreams of liberating girls from the evils she experienced.

Fourteen Years with Kids Alive

Kriskelly came to Kids Alive in 2009 when he was ten years old after suffering abuse from a violent stepfather. The mother divorced the man, but she was too ill to care for Kriskelly.

We enrolled him in Hall Mead School, where he received better nutrition and an education. Kriskelly also participated in devotions that introduced him to the God of the Bible. He spent the next fourteen years with us. The years of love, care, trauma therapy, and spiritual education helped stabilize him.

Today, Kriskelly is back with his mother, who lives nearby. He's in the eleventh grade at a local school and plans to become a lawyer. Staff encouraged his mother to use her knitting skills to earn a sustainable living. She makes beautiful clothes for adults and children. We are still working with them to ensure their success.

- Twenty-seven families learned child safety and healthy
 parenting practices through KAI programs. This kind of
 community outreach program raises awareness and
 encourages safer communities.
 - 2. Over 600 children learned about the God of the Bible. We conducted Bible study and discipleship classes, Sunday School programs, daily devotional forums, and other related events. These events inspire socialization and strengthen our relationships with local churches and the community.
 - 3. Staff members improved their trauma therapy skills. They participated in training sessions in our model of therapy, enabling them to handle complex cases and help the children experience the joy of recovery.
